Citizens of Macoupin County,

The Macoupin County Public Health Department (MCPHD) is pleased to present this Annual Report, which details our accomplishments in Fiscal Year 2025 and outlines our vision for the future of public health in Macoupin County. We hope the pages that follow reflect our steadfast dedication to serving the health needs of our residents.

Since the transition to our new Administrative team in January 2023, the past three years have been a period of transformation and growth for our organization. What began as a year-and-a-half of intensive learning in 2023 and 2024 has evolved into a time of refinement and forward momentum in 2025. Our team continues to build upon the foundational work of restructuring programs, shaping them into models we believe best serve our patients. With over 40 years of combined experience, our C-suite team has not only embraced the challenges of transition but has also guided the organization toward greater stability. Today, our programs are operating with improved efficiency, and we continue to focus on ensuring their sustainability well into the future.

As we put together our Annual Report for FY25, we must take this opportunity to mention the completion of our Illinois Project for Local Assessment of Needs (IPLAN) in January 2025. The IPLAN is a community health assessment and planning tool based on the National Association of County and City Health Officials Protocol for Excellence in Public Health (APEX-PH) model. The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) adopted the IPLAN as their tool for certifying local health departments under the Illinois Administrative Code Section 600.400. The IPLAN is based on the core functions of public health programming and must be conducted every five years by all local health departments.

Successful completion of the IPLAN process involves the work of a few groups: the local health department team of experts, the residents in the county the IPLAN is being written for, and the IPLAN Community Health Committee. The essential elements of IPLAN are: an organizational capacity assessment, a community health needs assessment, and a community health plan, focusing on a minimum of three priority health problems. The purpose of the Organizational Capacity Assessment is to review and assess the internal status of the local health department while the results provide direction for the department regarding improvement of organizational capacity.

The purpose of the Community Health Needs Assessment is to bring residents together to one common platform where they can provide their thoughts and opinions about the community's strengths, weaknesses, and areas for improvement, and ultimately identify what residents view as the top health priorities in the county. Information gathered from the Organizational Capacity Assessment and the Community Health Needs Assessment is reviewed and brought together in one space with the creation of the Community Health Plan. This plan is a five-year strategy which is used to specifically address the community health needs that were identified in the assessment and lays out how the local health department will address the issues over the five-year period. The end result of this project is a community health plan that has been created and is fully supported by the local health department, the Macoupin County Board of Health, the Community Health Committee, and the residents of Macoupin County. The health priorities identified in MCPHD's 2024-2029 IPLAN are: Mental Health; Substance Use; and Child Abuse and Neglect.

We remain committed delivering programs and services that respond to the diverse needs of our communities. These efforts include health clinic care, school-based counseling, and mobile units that extend dental, medical, behavioral health, and public health support throughout the county as well as high-quality treatment and recovery

options for individuals facing substance use disorders. Beyond this, we take pride in the wide range of our public health initiatives, including environmental health services, i.e. food establishment inspections, radon testing, vector control, domestic violence support, and school health programs. Our Women, Infants, and Children program further strengthens our commitment to maternal and child health by ensuring families across the county receive the resources and care they need.

As we step into 2026, we pause to reflect on the journey from January 2023 to today—a period marked by challenges met with resilience, perseverance, and unwavering dedication. The changes we have embraced and the lessons we have learned continue to shape our path forward, fueling the same determination that has carried us to this point. We are deeply thankful for our loyal and hardworking staff, recognizing that every role across every department is essential to keeping our programs strong. Just as important, we acknowledge that without our patients and the staff who serve them, our mission would not be possible.

The COVID-19 pandemic and recent changes in administration and funding at the state and federal levels, have reminded us that public health must always be ready to confront challenges we cannot yet foresee. Our commitment remains steadfast: to meet these challenges directly while navigating the ever-changing landscape of both public and private health care delivery. Year after year, we recognize that while the future of public health in Macoupin County will continue to evolve, the strength of our Board of Health, Health Center Board, and the professionalism of our staff form the foundation of our preparedness. Together, their dedication and expertise ensure we are equipped to manage both the pressures and the successes that come with serving our community's health needs.

ILLINOIS PROJECT FOR THE LOCAL ASSESSMENT OF NEEDS 2024 – 2029

Our 5-year IPAN (Illinois Project for Local Assessment of Needs) Community Health Planning process was submitted to the Illinois Department of Public Health during FY '25 with the participation of thirteen local Community Health Committee members. In accordance with the Certified Local Health Department Code (77 Ill. Adm. Code 600); Section 600.400 (e) (1), the I-PLAN's required components, which include the Community Health Needs Assessment, Community Health Plan, and Organizational Capacity Assessment were completed in 2024. The Board of Health reviewed and approved the department's process and report in their regular meeting on November 20, 2024. The I-PLAN, consisting of the Organizational Capacity Assessment attestation, the Community Health Needs Assessment, and the Community Health Plan, was reviewed and the recertification of the Macoupin County Public Health Department was granted by the Illinois Department of Public Health in February 2025. The 5-year Community Health Plan is effective from October 28, 2024 through October 27, 2029. The Macoupin County Public Health Department continues operating as an Illinois Department of Public Health Certified Local Health Department.

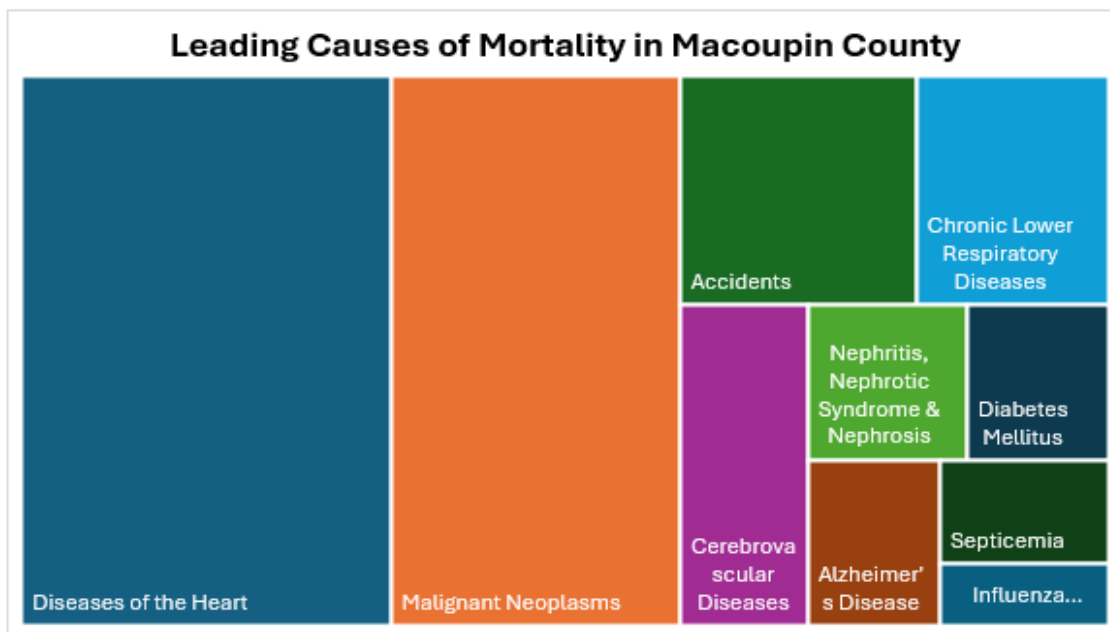

10. Hosted monthly Macoupin County Network Alliance meetings with community partners

11. Continued to be a host site for a monthly support group facilitated by National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI).
