Citizens of Macoupin County,

This report provides a review of the Macoupin County Public Health Department's (MCPHD) many accomplishments for Fiscal Year 2024 as well as a picture of the future of public health for Macoupin County. As you review our Annual Report, we hope that our dedication to providing the best public health services to the residents of Macoupin County is evident.

In January 2023, we experienced a change in administration that, although anticipated, catapulted 2023/2024 into a year-and-a-half of major learning experiences. Our administrative team broke down programs to their core foundations and have taken the past year to mold these programs into what we wholeheartedly believe work best for our health center patients. With nearly 40 years of collective experience, our C-suite team has embraced the challenges that they have faced over the past year and have worked with the administrative team to ensure our programs are running as smoothly as possible in the present while also preparing for future sustainability.

As we put together our Annual Report for FY24, we cannot help but mention that this is also the time that our Illinois Project for Local Assessment of Needs (IPLAN) is due to be renewed. The IPLAN is a community health assessment and planning process which is conducted every five years by local health departments all across Illinois. The IPLAN is based on the Assessment Protocol for Excellence in Public Health (APEX-PH) model and completion of the IPLAN fulfills the majority of the requirements for Local Health Department certification under the Illinois Administrative Code Section 600.400. In late 2019, the three health priorities, identified as the greatest health challenges in Macoupin County, were substance abuse, mental health, and cardiovascular disease. Our 2019-2024 Assessment brought together four MCPHD staff members and 24 volunteers who met to discuss the health care needs of our community. Community input is critical to the process of accessing the health problems and health care needs of the community adequately.

With that said, progress has been made on our 2024-2029 IPLAN and it is close to completion. We used a community survey model and asked Macoupin County residents for their input on identifying the three health priorities for Macoupin County. The total number of residents who responded to the survey was 146. We took their input and provided it to a team of 12 community leaders who then narrowed down the top three health priorities as mental health, substance use/abuse, and child abuse and neglect. At our November board meeting, our board members will be asked to review and approve our 2024-2029 IPLAN and it will then be made available on our website. The information within the plan is critical and will be used when searching for future grant funding opportunities and for the overall future growth of our health department.

We will continue to challenge ourselves to develop and implement programs and services which meet the needs of our patients. Such programs include health clinic services, school counseling services, and mobile unit services for dental, medical, behavioral health, and public health needs. Our St. Francis Way Clinic, which was opened in September 2020, continues to provide quality Level One treatment and recovery services for those needing substance use disorder services. Additionally, we are proud of our many programs which provide a variety of public health services such as: environmental health (food establishment inspections, radon screenings, vector control, etc.), domestic violence, school health, early childhood health, dental, medical, behavioral health, and substance use. Additionally, our Women, Infants, and Children program and our Healthy Families Macoupin County program work together to provide services which meet the maternal and child health needs of county residents.

As we look toward 2025, we hope to be able to take a deep breath and look back on January 2023 to the present time as a time of many challenges that were overcome with hard work, perseverance, and dedication. We often reflect on the changes that have been made and the lessons we have learned and we plan to carry on with the same drive and determination that brought us to where we are today. We are grateful for our loyal and hard-working staff and we know that it takes every role and position in every one of our departments to keep our programs running. Without our patients and without our staff who provide services to those patients, our doors would not be open.

As the COVID-19 pandemic taught us, we must be prepared for public health challenges that we do not yet know exist in the future. We remain dedicated to face all of these challenges head on within the context of the continually evolving public and private health care delivery system. As we say every year, the future of public health in Macoupin County may be ever-evolving, but the dedication and experience of Macoupin County's Board of Health, Health Center Board, and the professionalism present among the Health Department staff provide the foundation of preparedness for dealing with the stressors and the victories within the realm of providing public health care services.

On behalf of the Macoupin County Board of Health and the staff of the Macoupin County Public Health Department, we are proud to present you with the 42nd Annual Report.

The 5-year Community Health Plan is effective from 10/28/19 through 10/27/24. The Macoupin County Public Health Department continues operating as an Illinois Department of Public Health Certified Local Health Department.



Community facilities are not responsible for services or activities conducted during these clinics.
